# Charging and Remissions Policy

## Aim

Great Sankey Primary School aims to make a broad programme of activities accessible to as many pupils as possible. This Charging Policy informs all stakeholders about charging for school activities. It conforms to the requirements of the guidance detailed in 'A Guide to the Law for School Governors' and in DfE Guidance on 'Charging for School Activities' November 2013).

#### Policy Objectives and Practice

Charging: No pupil should have his/her curriculum limited by charges. However, the school reserves the right to levy a charge in any circumstances permissable under statute as detailed below. When charges are to be made, the school reserves the absolute right to determine whether the activity has to be cancelled if an insufficient number of families are prepared to pay for the activity to take place.

Voluntary Contributions: Where a charge cannot be made (as is often the case for activities which are an essential part of the curriculum, or religious education) parents may nevertheless be asked to make a voluntary contribution. The matter of voluntary contribution will not be a factor in deciding whether a pupil is allowed to participate in an activity to be financed by voluntary contributions.

Remissions: The school will apply the statutory minimum remissions to any charges that they make. However, no pupil shall be placed at an educational disadvantage because of a parent's unwillingness or inability to contribute. In the case of particular need, remission outside these parameters will be at the absolute discretion of the Headteacher. Liability for Personal Property: The school does not accept liability for any items of personal property lost or damaged in school, although in exceptional circumstances a contribution to the replacement of a lost or damaged item may be made at the absolute discretion of the Headteacher. Parents may also be asked to make a contribution towards replacing damaged or lost school property caused willfully or negligently by their child(ren).

In accordance with all the above guidelines, Great Sankey Primary School:

- Will not charge for books, materials, equipment and instruction in connection with the National Curriculum or Statutory Religious Education taught at school, except where parents have indicated in advance their wish to purchase the product.
- Will not charge for any activities that take place in school time, apart from instrumental tuition for individual pupils or pupils in small groups additional to the core teaching of music through the National Curriculum.
- May charge for school-time activities by asking parents and carers to make voluntary contributions to enable school funds to go further. Children of parents who do not contribute will not be treated differently from those that do.
- Will have the right to cancel an activity if there are insufficient voluntary contributions to make the activity possible.
- May charge for board, lodgings and transport on residential courses. Parents in receipt of benefits may be entitled to concessions and should contact the school in confidence, for further details.
- May permit organisations to charge parents when such an organisation is acting independently of the School or Local Authority, to arrange an activity to take place during school hours and parents want their children to join in the activity.
- May charge for activities which happen outside School hours when these activities are not necessarily part of the National Curriculum.

The Governors will review the lettings charges levied by the school on a regular basis.
